Patrick Shaw-Stewart	Shaw-Stewart	Patrick Houston Shaw-Stewart (1888-1917) - a British scholar and poet of the Edwardian era who died on active service as a battalion commander in the Royal Naval Division during WW1. He is best remembered today for his "Achilles in the Trench", one of the best-known war poems of the First World War. He was a leading member of Lady Diana Manners (qv) "corrupt coterie" known as the Coterie

Edward Horner	Horner	Edward Horner (1888-1917) - the only surviving son and heir of Sir John and Lady Frances Horner and a member of an extended upper-class social group known as the Coterie, many of whom, like Edward, were killed in WW1. He was wounded in May 1915 and did not return to the war until early 1917. He was assigned a staff post, but again secured a transfer to the front line. Shortly after his return to the fighting, on 21 November 1917, he was wounded again and died the same day

G Grenfell	Grenfell	Possibly Gerald William ("Billy") Grenfell (1890 - 1915) - British soldier poet - He was killed at Hooge, West Flanders, Belgium on 30 July 1915. His body was buried where he fell and he has no known grave, but he is remembered on the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres
V Caillard	Caillard	Possibly Sir Vincent Henry Penalver Caillard (1856-1930) - a British Army officer, financier and municipal politician. He served as President of the Ottoman Public Debt Council and the Financial Director of Vickers. He was also a member of Joseph Chamberlain's Tariff Commission and a county alderman on the London County Council for the Municipal Reform Party. A close associate of Sir Basil Zaharoff, Caillard played a key role in making Zaharoff's services available to H. H. Asquith and David Lloyd George as an agent of influence in the Levant.
