In his career as a civil servant, he worked as private secretary to a succession of the United Kingdom's most powerful ministers, particularly Winston Churchill. He was a discreet but influential figure within Britain's homosexual community. In 1915, Marsh became Assistant Private Secretary to Prime Minister H. H. Thus it was that, as the adopted daughter of the Duchess, Rachel married a young millionaire mine-owner, landlord of 30,000 acres, two country houses and a palatial residence in London's Carlton Gardens. Her wedding to the 2nd Earl of Dudley in 1891 took place in the presence of Edward, Prince of Wales, who was an intimate friend of the groom's mother. The marriage ended in 1912. The Countess died in Ireland, in June 1920, from a heart attack while swimming, watched helplessly by her maid on the shore. |  |
