15v	Tuesday, 14 April 1914	Diana Manners	Manners	Diana, Viscountess Norwich, née Lady Diana Olivia Winifred Maud Manners (1892-1986) - an English actress and aristocrat who was a well-known social figure in London and Paris. As a young woman, she associated with the celebrated group of intellectuals known as the Coterie
		Edward Horner	Horner	Edward Horner (1888-1917) - the only surviving son and heir of Sir John and Lady Frances Horner and a member of an extended upper-class social group known as the Coterie, many of whom, like Edward, were killed in WW1. He was wounded in May 1915 and did not return to the war until early 1917. He was assigned a staff post, but again secured a transfer to the front line. Shortly after his return to the fighting, on 21 November 1917, he was wounded again and died the same day
		Titchfield	Titchfield	William Arthur Henry Cavendish-Bentinck, 7th Duke of Portland, KG (1893- 1977), styled Marquess of Titchfield until 1943 - a British peer and Conservative Party politician. Portland was the elder son of William Cavendish-Bentinck, 6th Duke of Portland, and his wife, Winifred Anna (née Dallas-Yorke). He was a second cousin of Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother
		Duff Cooper	Cooper	Alfred Duff Cooper, 1st Viscount Norwich, GCMG, DSO, PC (1890-1954), known as Duff Cooper - a British Conservative Party politician and diplomat who was also a military and political historian. Almost all his closest friends, including Shaw-Stewart, Horner and Asquith were killed in WW1, allowing him to draw closer to Lady Diana Manners, a socialite who was known for her eccentricities, whom he married on 2 June 1919.

		Machaine of Lochbuie	Machaine	Possibly Kenneth Maclaine, the twenty-fourth chief of Lochbuie, made a mark for himself by going on the stage as a singer to try to forestall the closure of the Lochbuie estates on the isle of Mull in the Inner Hebrides. Unfortunately, the onset of the First World War made it impossible for him to avoid the inevitable, and the entire estates of some thirty thousand acres were lost. Kenneth served with distinction throughout the war, being awarded the Military Cross twice and the Croix de Guerre with Palm.

	Katharine Asquith	Asquith	Katharine Frances Asquith née Horner (1885-1976) was an English landowner and patron of the arts. During WW1, she served as a Voluntary Aid Detachment nurse - Wife of Raymond Asquith and daughter-in-law of wartime prime minister H H Asquith.

Adele Essex	Essex	Adele Beach Capell, Countess of Essex, née Adele Beach Grant (1866-1922) - an American-born socialite who married into the British nobility. She was also a vegetarianism activist. She married George Devereux de Vere Capell, 7th Earl of Essex, at St Margaret's, Westminster on 14 December 1893.
