

		Violet Manners	Manners	Marion Margaret Violet Manners, Duchess of Rutland, née Lindsay (1856-1937) - a British artist and noblewoman. Violet was a prominent member of The Souls, an aristocratic social circle that favoured intellectual pursuits and avant-garde artistic tastes.
		Betty Manners	Manners	Possibly Betty Constance Asquith née Manners (1889-1962), wife of Hon. Arthur Melland Asquith
		Laura Lister	Lister	Possibly Hon Laura Lister (1892-1965)
		Cynthia Charteris	Charteris	Lady Cynthia Mary Evelyn Asquith née Charteris (1887-1960) - an English writer and socialite, known for her ghost stories and diaries. She also wrote novels, edited a number of anthologies and wrote for
		Patrick Shaw-Stewart	Shaw-Stewart	Patrick Houston Shaw-Stewart (1888-1917) - a British scholar and poet of the Edwardian era who died on active service as a battalion commander in the Royal Naval Division during WW1. He is best remembered today for his "Achilles in the Trench", one of the best-known war poems of the First World War. He was a leading member of Lady Diana Manners (qv) "corrupt coterie" known as the Coterie
		Compton	Compton	Lord Alwyne Frederick Compton, DSO, DL (1855 -1911) - a British Army officer who became a Liberal Unionist and then Unionist politician
		Granby	Granby	Henry Manners, Marquess of Granby, later 8th Duke of Rutland
		B Grenfell	Grenfell	Possibly William Henry Grenfell, 1st Baron Desborough, KG, GCVO, DL (1855-1945) - a British athlete, sportsman, public servant and politician. He sat in the House of Commons first for the Liberal Party and then for the Conservatives between 1880 and 1905 when he was raised to the peerage
		E Marsh	Marsh	Probably Sir Edward Howard Marsh KCVO CB CMG (1872-1953) - a British polymath, translator, arts patron and civil servant. He was the sponsor of the Georgian school of poets and a friend to many poets, including Rupert Brooke and Siegfried Sassoon. In his career as a civil servant, he worked as private secretary to a succession of the United Kingdom's most powerful ministers, particularly Winston Churchill. He was a discreet but influential figure within Britain's homosexual community. In 1915, Marsh became Assistant Private Secretary to Prime Minister H. H. Asquith in which position he served until the fall of Asquith's government in December 1916.
		Diana Manners	Manners	Diana, Viscountess Norwich, née Lady Diana Olivia Winifred Maud Manners (1892-1986) - an English actress and aristocrat who was a well-known social figure in London and Paris. As a young woman, she associated with the celebrated group of intellectuals known as the Coterie
	Herbert Asquith	Asquith	Possibly Herbert Dixon Asquith (1881-1947) - an English poet, novelist, and lawyer. Nicknamed "Beb" by his family, he was the second son of H. H. Asquith, British Prime Minister and the younger brother of Raymond Asquith	
	Edmond L Warre	Warre	Possibly Edmond Warre CB CVO (1837-1920) - Headmaster and Provost of Eton College (1884-1905)
