		V Caillard	Caillard	Possibly Sir Vincent Henry Penalver Caillard (1856-1930) - a British Army officer, financier and municipal politician. He served as President of the Ottoman Public Debt Council and the Financial Director of Vickers. He was also a member of Joseph Chamberlain's Tariff Commission and a county alderman on the London County Council for the Municipal Reform Party. A close associate of Sir Basil Zaharoff, Caillard played a key role in making Zaharoff's services available to H. H. Asquith and David Lloyd George as an agent of influence in the Levant.

	Monday, 1 May 1911	Edmond L Warre	Warre	Possibly Edmond Warre CB CVO (1837-1920) - Headmaster and Provost of Eton College (1884-1905)
		Raymond Greene	Greene	Sir Walter Raymond Greene, 2nd Baronet, DSO (1869-1947) - a British Conservative politician. He was the second son of Edward Greene (later Sir Edward Greene, 1st Baronet) of Nether Hall, Suffolk. Greene served on the western front throughout WW1. He initially served with the 9th Queen's Royal Lancers, winning the Distinguished Service Order (DSO). He later commanded the 2/3rd County of London Yeomanry (Sharpshooters), before ending the war as a staff officer. Following the war, he successfully defended his parliamentary seat in 1918. On the death of his father in 1920, he succeeded to the baronetcy
		David Henderson	Henderson	Lieutenant General Sir David Henderson, KCB, KCVO, DSO (1862-1921) - the senior leader of British military aviation during WW1, having previously established himself as the leading authority on tactical intelligence in the British Army. He served as the commander of the Royal Flying Corps in the field during the first year of WW1 and was instrumental in establishing the Royal Air Force as an independent service. After the war Henderson was the first Director-General of the League of Red Cross Societies
		Ian Henderson	Henderson	Captain Ian Henry David Henderson MC (1896-1918) – only son of David above - a British World War I flying ace, he was killed in a flying accident in 1918
		Nettie Henderson	Henderson	Henrietta Caroline née Dundas, wife of David above

		Harry Graham	Graham	Possibly Jocelyn Henry Clive (Harry) Graham (1874-1936) - From 1898 to 1904 Graham was an Aide de Camp to Gilbert John Elliot-Murray-Kynynmound, the 4th Earl of Minto, the Governor General of Canada. From 1904 to 1906 he was Private Secretary to Archibald Philip Primrose Rosebery the 5th Earl of Rosebery a former Liberal Prime Minister. In 1906 he became a full-time writer of comic verse, lyrics for musical comedies, play-scripts, and comic prose.

E Marsh	Marsh	Probably Sir Edward Howard Marsh KCVO CB CMG (1872-1953) - a British polymath, translator, arts patron and civil servant. He was the sponsor of the Georgian school of poets and a friend to many poets, including Rupert Brooke and Siegfried Sassoon. In his career as a civil servant, he worked as private secretary to a succession of the United Kingdom's most powerful ministers, particularly Winston Churchill. He was a discreet but influential figure within Britain's homosexual community. In 1915, Marsh became Assistant Private Secretary to Prime Minister H. H. Asquith in which position he served until the fall of Asquith's government in December 1916.
Walter Townley	Townley	Sir Walter Beaupré Townley KCMG (1863-1945) - a British diplomat, who most notably served as the British Ambassador to the Netherlands during the final years of WW1
Susan Townley	Townley	Lady Susan née Keppel, daughter of William Keppel, 7th Earl of Albemarle
Alexander Hoyos	Hoyos	Possibly Ludwig Alexander Georg Graf von Hoyos, Freiherr zu Stichsenstein (1876-1937) - an Austro-Hungarian diplomat who played a major role during the July Crisis (following the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand in Sarajevo on 28 June 1914) while serving as chef de cabinet of the Foreign Minister at the outbreak of WW1 in 1914

Ian Hamilton	Hamilton	Possibly General Sir Ian Standish Monteith Hamilton , GCB, GCMG, DSO, TD (1853-1947) - senior British Army officer who had an extensive British Imperial military career in the Victorian and Edwardian eras. He served as General Officer Commanding Southern Command between 1905 and 1909 and was serving as Adjutant-General to the Forces between 1909 and 1910
